Review of 'Much Ado About Nothing'

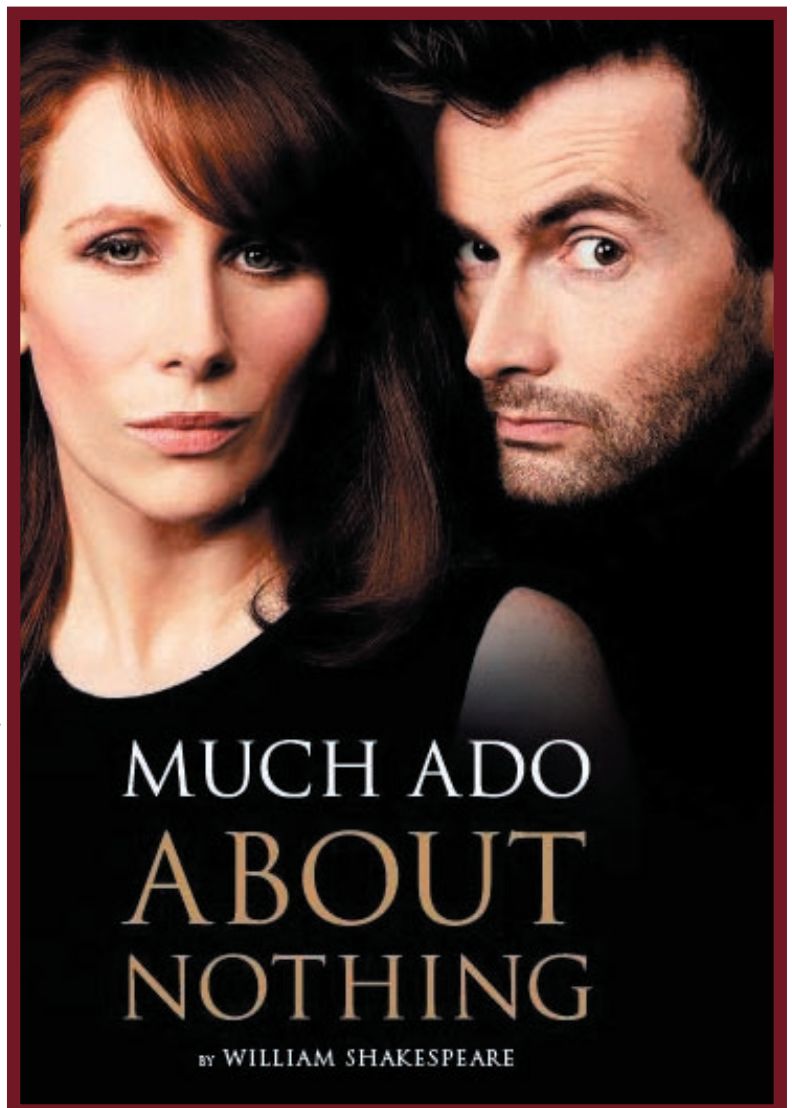
'Much Ado About Nothing', was seen live on stage at the Wyndham's Theatre, London, by most of Year 9 on 21st June 2011, starring David Tennant and Catherine Tate. Obviously, they were the stars of the show, and all of those that went to see it have come back explaining how fantastic the show was.

It is a modern day adaptation of the play William Shakespeare wrote, and it is one like nothing that anyone has ever seen before. It is set in the 1970s-80s period, which does make some considerable changes to what the original is like. Also, characters have been added or taken away by director Josie Rourke, which altogether makes it a completely different atmosphere and style to how the play would have been performed in Shakespeare's day.

Seeing as David Tennant and Catherine Tate are well known from television series like 'Doctor Who', and are friends off stage as well, they seemed an ideal casting for the roles of Benedick and Beatrice. As predicted, they turned out to be an outstanding success in the play, and they used their identities and fame to create humour in a new way, which is not written in the script. They also appeared to be funnier than the supposedly 'funny' characters like Dogberry and the Watch because of this. They also interacted well with the audience, and although the play is scripted, they had to make up the interaction themselves on the spot.

All this was allowed to happen because of many things: for example, all of the characters were very exaggerated, and there were certain characteristics for each character. The stage (design by Robert Jones) also revolved, allowing the audience to get a 360 degree view of what was going on on the stage. As in the time however, men appeared to be the dominant figures in society, when the characters were socialising and playing tricks on one another.

Because the play is set in a much more modern time, other things can happen which wouldn't be able to otherwise. For instance, when the stag and hen nights are going on, and in fact throughout the play, people are smoking cigarettes, which would never have happened in Shakespearean times, because they didn't exist. At the masked ball, there were masks that could be seen of Darth Vader, Mario and Miss Piggy from The Muppets. They were drinking from cans, and David Tennant even appeared in a golf buggy at one point! A boy (who was in more scenes than he is in the text) was often playing with a Rubik's Cube. And it was not only that boy who was added, Leonato (Jonathan Coy) now had a wife and Antonio





(Leonato's brother) was nowhere to be seen. Leonato's wife ('Innogen', Anna Farnworth) took Antonio's lines, which worked well, adding to the tension, drama and comedy.

Most of the effects on the audience involved the audience screaming with laughter, and David Tennant and Catherine Tate each had many different moments where they had the audience in stitches. To create drama, however, Leonato, at the wedding scene (which seemed considerably shorter than in the playscript), started strangling his daughter Hero (Sarah Macrae), when he supposedly found out that she was guilty of having an affair with another man. This happened after he got increasingly frustrated throughout the wedding, and eventually, Leonato's wife was the one empathising with her daughter, even though she isn't in the original play.

Overall, it was one of the best Shakespeare revival plays that anyone our age has ever seen, and the cast, director and producer (Sonia Freedman) are all to thank for the wonderful piece of theatre that they have put on for the audience.

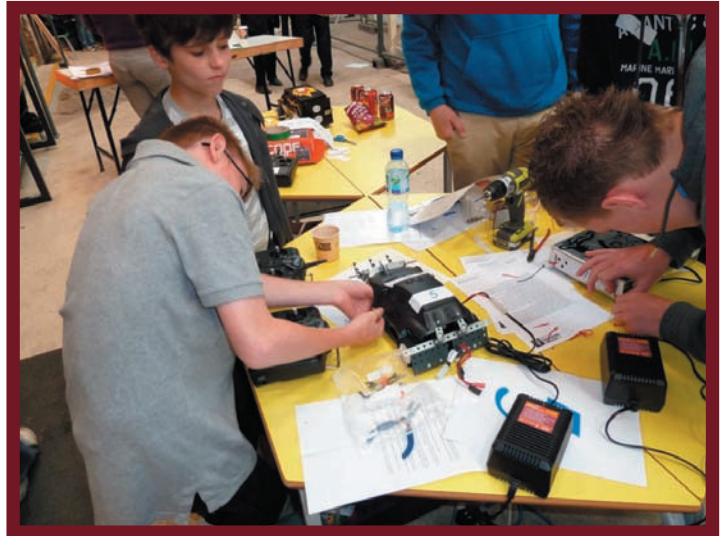


Battle Of The Bots

Global Maths Challenge Winners

In early May, the department registered with mangahigh.com, a huge online maths resource fronted by well-know mathematician and TV personality Professor Marcus Du Sautoy. It is used throughout the world and had previously been a subscription site but recently became free to UK schools. It is now used by about 3000 UK schools, including many grammars and independents, and another 3000 from around the world.

About 600 of our students have used Mangahigh, and most seem to thoroughly enjoy its competitive nature – seeking to improve their scores for self-satisfaction, comparing with friends, other classes, year groups and schools. Certainly the amount of time spent on Maths outside of the classroom has grown.

We didn't immediately realise, but on joining we found ourselves taking part in the UK Maths Challenge which was already up and running. Over the following days we noted our position start to improve and with a week to go we entered the top ten. A final push saw us head the UK table with three days to go. Then we realised that there were similar Challenges taking place around the world, and so with a final effort we managed to overhaul an American school to become the

Global Maths Challenge Winners for May.

Mangahigh reported our achievement on their website: "TWGSB students' achievement is particularly impressive considering they started using Mangahigh on 6th May, so only had 3 weeks in which to amass this huge score, playing over 5000 maths games, and over 6000 Prodigy lessons in the process!"

During June, Mangahigh set-up a head-to-head round-based challenge between us and the champion school of Australasia, which we won 5-0. That proved a useful stepping-stone to us comfortably retaining our UK and Global Challenge crowns in June.

It is going to be difficult to maintain our position at the top – that is the nature of Mangahigh – it will become harder for our students to score points because they will be faced with more demanding challenges. As far as we know, no school has completed a UK or Global treble – but we will give it our best shot!

Jaguar Cars 'Maths in Motion'

National Final

For the third time in four years, we had a pair of students reach the National Final of what is the largest, in terms of numbers of students who take part, of all the maths competitions.

Ben Howe and Stuart Hosiene (both Year 10) recount their day at the Final:

"The Jaguar Cars 'Maths in Motion' National Final took place at the Heritage Motor Centre, in Warwickshire. After a lengthy drive around the M25 and M40, and breakfast on the school, we arrived in good spirits and ready to race.

Seated at our designated table, we were greeted by the organisers and by a Jaguar representative. They told us that getting to the final was a fantastic achievement, and even though there would only be one winner, we should all be proud of ourselves.



We then opened the brown envelope, and had our first glance at the "Trowbridge" track. It had everything - long bends, tight corners, and a tricky-to-measure special feature. And we only had an hour and a half to go from a track plan and some blank sheets of paper to an amazing, finely tuned, championship winning, race-car.

After about forty-five minutes, we were asked for our best practice lap time, so that everyone could get an idea of where they might be on the starting grid, and make further experiments and

adjustments as necessary. Ten minutes later, we had improved our laptime to 117 seconds, which put us sixth on the grid.

We then had to move from qualifying speeds - which you can maintain for about one lap, to race speeds, which needed to see us last the full 57 laps. After we had worked out roughly how long a lap would last, we had to sort out our pit stops.

We chose to go for a two-stop strategy, with one pit stop on lap 22, and another on lap 46 (to co-ordinate with the weather). By this time, we discovered a critical error - our calculation on how much fuel we needed per lap was wrong! We had no option but to re-calculate it - and with less than five minutes to go!

After we finished our lunch break, we went back into the auditorium and the tension was unbearable! First was the teachers' race, which Mr Young won - he received various prizes including a cup and a bottle of champagne.

Finally, it was time for our race! Once the race started, we dropped back a few grid positions, but this was because some people had very little fuel, so had lighter cars. After their cars ran out of fuel, we moved up a little, then dropped back again to finish 12th overall (out of 35), and 6th in our age range (out of 12). It was a really great day!

Year 7 Inter-House Maths Challenge

Forty-eight students recently took part in the Year 7 Inter-House Maths Challenge, which was a most enjoyable and active day of mathematical problem solving. On arrival the boys were given some warm up questions to prepare their brains for the competition! The first challenge involved the whole team working together to solve mathematical problems. The second activity was a head-to-head competition, followed by the Relay. In the head-to-head, each team of four was divided into two pairs, A and B. Pair A was given odd numbered questions and B had the even numbered questions. The answer to question 1 could be calculated without any additional information but each of the other questions required the previous answer before it could be solved. In the Relay, each pair took it in turn to answer a question. Once a question was finished one student had to run to their leader to get it marked and then take the next question to the other pair who were sitting at the opposite end of the hall. After lunch, the competition continued with different types of puzzles: tangrams, code breaking, maths cross-number puzzles and computer games.

After an extremely competitive day, Ospreys came first, with Falcons and Merlins coming second and third. Well done to the Osprey representatives: Tommy Monkton, Toby Osbourn, Lucas Murain, Josh Smith, Adam Sturgeon, Jack Black, Rowan Woolley and Rory Baker.

Mr Young presented the trophy to the Ospreys, and certificates and prizes to all of the participants. Well done to you all! And thank you to all of the Year 12 helpers.

Year 7 Tonbridge Maths Challenge

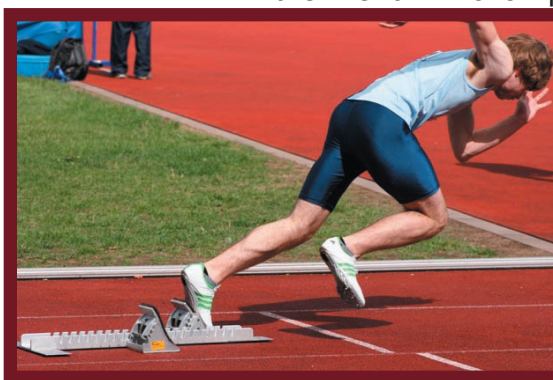
TWGSB athletes have performed strongly for Club, Borough and County teams this summer. Top performer has been Ed Hall with a 6th place in the prestigious English Schools' Inter Boys' 400m final, clocking a National Standard 49: 61s in the process. In addition, Ed ran for the Kent team in the 4x100m relay, gaining a silver medal. These performances followed on from a 1st place whilst representing Kent in an Inter Counties match; 1st and 2nd places in the 400m and 200m,

respectively, at the Kent Schools' Championships; and a 200m/400m golden double at the Kent AA Championships. Overall, Ed's performances see him ranked in the top-10 in the UK at 400m for his age group.

TWGSB's other medallist at the Kent Schools' Championships was Lewis Church with a bronze medal in the Junior Boys' High Jump, with a best clearance of 1.65m. This performance matched his three 3rd place finishes in the Kent AA Championships at the High Jump, 80 metres hurdles and Triple Jump. Lewis' efforts saw him rewarded with a Kent county vest at the South East Schools' Multi-Events' Championships.

Just missing out on a medal at the Kent Schools' Championships was Cameron Knapp with 4th place in the Inter Boys' 1500m but he has been rewarded with a huge new personal best of 4m16:76s. This followed up a new personal best in the Kent AA Championships 800m with 2m05.3s.

Also, making good progress on the track, despite being in the bottom of their age-group, are Alastair Bishop, with a 6th place in the U17 boys 1500m at the Kent AA championships in a new personal best of 4m35.6s and Chris Cohen with a 25-second pb in the 1500m in the corresponding U15 race, with 4m51:7s.
